We have a professional agency for</p>				

processing of exam results and printing of mark sheets which also generates performance reports as required. This agency is responsible for maintaining confidentiality and upgrading of system with the changing University rules. 3. Administrative tasks are distributed to different sections in the office which looks after maintenance of records of personnel relating to appointment, salary, retirement and all such matters. It is partially digitised as files have to be maintained for inspection by government and University appointed bodies. 4. Admission procedure is fully digitised beginning with submission of forms to payment of fees for final admission. College uses its own website to link with a designated bank's payment gateway which automatically transfers funds to the specific accounts maintained with them. Detailed reports of forms submitted can be monitored in real time while payment summary is generated on the same day and other reports on t1 basis. 5. Scholarships granted under government schemes is routed through online submission on government portal which generates the list. Scholarships and concessions provided by the college and nongovernment bodies are routed through the same desk. All related records are available at one place. These procedures constitute the MIS which aids decision making by the concerned authorities in the organisation.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Each department prepares its own academic calendar which is prepared after departmental discussions. This is then shared with vice-principals and principal after which a college academic calendar is made ready. The university academic calendar is also consulted for the same. The schedule of activities, tentative dates of tests and exams, syllabi is all uploaded on the college website. There is an Academic Planning board in the college which deliberates and gives suggestions on teaching, learning and evaluation and also co-curricular activities to be organised during academic year. Each department has a google form on which all events and activities are uploaded so that information reaches the website immediately. The Exam Committee looks into smooth conduct of all exams and timely declaration of results. Many of our teachers are part of university BOS and work as paper setters. Past year's

papers are stored in the library for students' reference. Some departments have their own library from where students can borrow books. Proper attendance records are maintained by Attendance Committee and defaulters are required to give an undertaking saying they will improve their attendance. Every classroom is well equipped with microphone, LCD projector, white and black boards and smart boards. Notice boards on each floor display relevant academic information from time to time. The principal along with Vice-principal conducts review meetings of each department separately in each semester to understand the shortcomings, challenges and ways to resolve the same. IQAC in the beginning of each semester chalks out all the activities and initiative that are required to be conducted in each semester with a focus on enhancing the quality of teaching-learning as well as imparting life skills to teachers, students and Non-teaching staff. There are several statutory and non-statutory committees which look into every aspect of the functioning of the college and closely monitor the activities.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Feedback is obtained from students and employers. The feedback is analyzed by IQAC and the Teachers 'Awards Committee which looks at areas that need improvement. In case of lacunae in curriculum, Add-on Courses and Bridge Courses are conducted. Field visits are arranged to give the students a feel of industry. As far as teachers are concerned, any major gap in knowledge delivery is brought to the notice of the Head of the Department and resolved. In some cases it is referred to the Academic Planning Board which suggests interdisciplinary modules and innovative teaching methods. Refresher and Short Term courses help in keeping abreast of recent developments. Feedback from employers obtained by self finance departments, help in training the students along with hands on experience with use of software etc. The feedback serves as an important indicator of the course of action to be taken. Every program like CPCA and SHP has their own feedback mechanism, which helps them continuously review and revise the modules to keep it relevant. Several departments conducts Meet the Parents activity each year, in which they take feedback from the parents upon the activities of the Department as well as the students. Alumni meet is conducted on regular basis each year in which alumni come back to college and convey their valuable feedback regarding new development in course curriculum and new initiative in the industry . Alumni are aslo connected to their departments through social media and several alumni come back to conduct awareness programs with current students on career avenues and requirements of the industry.</p>

Mentoring system is followed at F.Y., S.Y. T.Y. level. Looking at the academic performance of the students, they are grouped for peer mentoring and teachers' mentoring system. Self finance courses hold Peer Mentoring System where, academically brighter student mentor the weaker ones. In this way both the groups of students have a win-win situation. Brighter students gain confidence and weaker students can be more open with their peers. In Teachers' Mentoring, all the students are divided into groups and each teacher mentor a group of students. This is called Students Nurturing Programme in the Science stream. The teacher meets her assigned group of students several times during the year. He/she understands students' difficulties at personal and academic level. Students are guided by teachers to make a study schedule by themselves and are advised how to study a difficult topics. Career guidance is also imparted. All teachers are available to students outside class

hours and students are personally counselled by teachers and Vice-Principals.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As per University regulations, in 2017-2018, continuous internal evaluation system was in place only for final year students. Internal marks were for 25 marks which includes a test and class room participation. Tests are held for all T.Y. students as per time-table prepared by the Examination Committee. Internal component of 25/100 marks continues for self-financed on project presentation for 25 marks which is on a continuous basis. Many departments conduct a preliminary exams for T.Y students before their final university examination. In addition, teachers conduct class tests and quizzes on a regular basis. Class room lectures also include revision tests both Oral and written. The unaided courses have projects and internal tests which are conducted on a regular basis as per time table prepared in the beginning of the year. Self-financing courses like B.Sc. (IT).B. Sc (Computer Science) and Biotechnology have a practical component of 50 marks and internal test of 25 marks.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Since 2016-17 the university has started conducting exams for all students (all semesters) and they are held as follows: Regular exams are held in November for semester I/III/V and in April for semester II/IV/VI. ATKT exams in the month of October and March. The University generally releases the exam schedule around September. However when the academic calendar is made, we keep in mind the examination dates and do not hold any activity in those months. All Departments give their departmental calendar is then made keeping in view all the above information.

i) A number of committees have been formed to look into various activities of the institution. Each committee functions under a coordinator who along with other members is empowered to take decisions and undertake activities. Each department functions independently under its own Head of Department. Departments intimate the administration about problems/ issues which get resolved by them. IQAC of the college also has independent external members on the committee who provide useful feedback and suggestions which are then implemented. ii) The college has a participative management style as it emphasizes the inclusivity of all stake holders in the functioning of the college. All major decisions are taken by sharing of information and ideas in meetings attended by stake holders. Curriculum Development	Teachers of the institution are members of the Board of Study of different subjects in the University. They are also members of Boards of Study of different subjects in Autonomous institutions. Teachers consult students, colleagues, industry participants and other stakeholders and carry the suggestions to the BOS where they are implemented whenever the curriculum is updated.
Teaching and Learning	There has been an enhanced use of ICT by faculty in andragogy. Teachers are increasingly using presentations, educational software, films and

documentaries to impart learning. Departments are also conducting seminars and workshops and inviting resource persons of great repute to the institution so as to provide a wider knowledge base to the students. Students are encouraged to use different learning programs by the teachers. Experiential learning is sought to be imparted by conducting field visits and industrial visits.

Examination and Evaluation

Under the University of Mumbai, a completely new online evaluation system called On Screen Marking (OSM) was started at the final year level. The institution was made a center for OSM and all its teachers evaluated their papers in a dedicated computer laboratory of the College. At the first and second year level the College has ear-marked a central assessment headquarter. However, flexibility is given to teachers for evaluation. The Examination Committee of the college ensures smooth conduct of all examinations. The results are outsourced to a reputed outside agency which ensures timely publication of results.

Research and Development

The college is a research hub for students and teacher researchers. Microbiology, Life Sciences, Statistics, Chemistry and Biotechnology have been awarded the STAR Scheme (for colleges) by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. Hence Each department conducts many research related activities throughout the year. The college has also received a grant under DST-FIST by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, hence enhanced research activities are conducted for the Post- Graduate courses of the Science stream. The college has also applied for an additional grant by DBT, Govt. of India under its Star Scheme for four departments of Sciences namely, Physics, Mathematics, Information Technology Computer Science. Apart from these the college has dedicated research oriented specialised Certificate programmes like the Science Honors Program (SHP) and Certificate Programme for Commerce Arts (CPCA), which is conducted for Science and Commerce and Arts students

respectively. These programmes are for one and a half years and one year in duration respectively in which each student takes up a research project under the guidance of a teacher mentor. Research methodology is inculcated in students and they present their research findings before external evaluators. Teachers publish their research papers in national and international peer- reviewed journals. Teachers are also encouraged to present their research papers in conferences and seminars. A few teachers have also presented papers and research posters at international conferences. For eg Dr Kulvinder Kaur of the Department of Commerce participated and won Silver medal in Inter-University Avishkar Convention organized by University of Mumbai. College conducts an annual intercollegiate research sharing experience called Anubhav, at which faculty across different colleges share their research papers and experiences. The college has an intercollegiate and interdisciplinary research journal called Srujan with an ISSN no which is published annually. Science Honors Program also comes out with its research publication called Jigyasa.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Every year the college infrastructure is renovated and the needs are addressed. A Fire Riser System was installed in the College. Furniture of the college was also refurbished. A number of new books and online resources were added to the library. The Auditorium and MMR was also renovated.upgradation of laboratories in department, computers were installed in statistics laboratory also different instruments were installed in Chemistry, Life sciences, Microbiology departments.

Human Resource Management

Teachers are regularly sent to take part in Orientation, Refresher and Short Term courses as per the requirements. The IQAC of the college also conducts a number of training programmes for teachers as well as non-teaching staff throughout the year. Teacher recruitment is also conducted as per and when required. Even if the University does not grant approved posts to the college, qualified teachers are recruited on contractual

	appointments to ensure that lectures are conducted smoothly.

This year the program was organised for 35 aunties from the old age home-All Saints Home and 50 senior citizens from Sneh-Bandhan, 50 child cancer patients from Tata Memorial Hospital along with their parents, 50 Thalassaemia Major children from Think foundation along with their parents and Swachhata Karamcharis from ward A,B,C of BMC. The highlight of the event was 'Swachhata Hi Seva' focusing on the celebration of 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi and Seva. The program included a Cultural program, delicious food and various games and gifts. It was held on 17 November 2018. The aim of the event is to honour those who are neglected by Society especially the sweepers of the Municipal Corporation. 2. The annual inter-collegiate competition Creative Expressions is organized by the Gender Issues cell. Its theme for this year being 'digital misogyny'. It consisted of events like The Untold Story, an event involving a short Netflix documentary screening of 'Audrie and Daisy' which led to an insightful discussion on the harmful effects of online trolling. The key-note speaker through her experiences urged the students to become aware of the digital misogyny lurking in the online space. The next session 'A journalists take on #Me Too', during which journalist Malini Bhupta shared her insights on the #Me Too movement, her contribution to the movement and the backlash and trolling she faced as a result of it. There were several competitions in the next segment such as essay writing, poetry, short story writing, photography and short-film making competition. The open mike event saw several students courageously express themselves through spoken word poetry and song creatively portraying the theme. The last evening, the annual fund-raiser had a wide range of stalls organised by the students. The events were held in January 2019. In addition to those referred in point 6.5.3 the other Best practices are Best Practices instituted by the college involve a number of social welfare schemes that are organised for the economically and socially background segments of society by the college students. a. A Farmers' Empowerment Scheme, whereby a group of students go to the villages to help in disseminating crucial information on farming techniques, drought management etc. to farmers. b. Every year several talented students of Municipality run schools are invited to display their dancing and singing talent at a large talent parade organised in the college. The entire event from picking up students to looking after their requirements and to dropping them back home is all organized by the college students, c.
